










Penn's Crossing

About the Area

Manheim Township was one of Lancaster County's first Townships established in 1729. It became a Township of the First Class in 1952 and endures in Lancaster County as the only First Class Township. Covering approximately 22.6 square miles, roughly 7.5 miles wide and 3.2 miles long, Manheim Township has a population of close to 40,000, making it the second largest municipality in terms of population in Lancaster County. However, despite its large population, Manheim Township is still defined as a small and serene farming community while remaining conveniently close to major transportation routes and amenities. Nestled within Lancaster County, it remains a popular family destination for decades, ranking among America's top 25 safest places to live.

Getting There:

From Lancaster, take 501 North/Lititz Pike for about four miles to a left on Bloomfield Drive. Turn left on Cobblers Court and follow to a right on Bowyer Lane.

Fast Facts: Lancaster County

Principal Town or City: City of Lancaster, the county seat

Transportation: Primary roads serving the area include US routes 30, 41, 72, 222, 283, 501, and interstate routes 76, 78, and 81. Public transportation is available within the greater Lancaster area. Daily air and rail services connect with major northeast hubs. The Harrisburg International Airport is only 30 minutes west.

Two Hours or Less: Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington D.C., and Atlantic beaches

Outdoor Recreation: Atlantic League baseball, Susquehannock State Park, Buchmiller Park, Conewago Recreation Trail, Lancaster County Central Park, Lancaster County Conservatory, Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area, Muddy Run Recreational Area, and state game lands, nature preserves, and fish and boat commission areas.

Education: Lancaster hosts eleven post-secondary training institutes, colleges, and universities; many more are nearby.

Neighboring Counties: York, Chester, Berks, Lebanon, Dauphin, and Harford County, MD
